- 2. Discuss Adam of Bremen's description of the heathen temple and heathen rites at Uppsala.
- 3. EITHER: (a) Describe the development and preservation of the text of *The Russian primary chronicle.*
 - OR: (b) Define 'the Normanist controversy' and the relevance of *The Russian primary chronicle* to it.
- 4. EITHER: (a) Discuss the evidence for the worship of the god Freyr in heathen Scandinavia.
 - OR: (b) Give a review of the main sources for the religion of Viking-Age heathens.
- 5. EITHER: (a) Give a critical account based on the Anglo-Saxon chronicle of Scandinavian activity in England over the period 789-1042.
 - OR: (b) Assess the historical significance of colonization by Danish Vikings of places outside Denmark.
- 6. What interest does Ibn Fadlan's account of the Rus on the Volga funeral have for the student of the Viking Age?
- 7. What information does Constantine Porphyrogenitus's *De administrando imperio* give concerning Rus traders and trade-routes between Kiev and Constantinople in the tenth century?
- 8. Give some account of the various forms of warfare as conducted by the Vikings.
- Write notes on THREE of the following: Norse ship-names; human sacrifice in the Viking Age; the poem *Rigspula*; the *Vanir* in Norse mythology; Liudprand of Cremona and his information of Norse interest; the Viking ship-burial on the Île de Groix; Óláfr Tryggvason; duel in Viking-Age Scandinavia; the Norse site at L'Anse aux Meadows, Newfoundland; the Danelaw; Helgö, Uppland; Old Norse nið.
