- 2. 'In her belief that she can find her true selfhood when she leaves Torvald, Nora is just as romantic at the end of *A Doll's House* as she was at the beginning when she believed in the miracle.' Discuss.
- 3. To what extent may *The Wild Duck* be regarded as an attack on idealism?
- What provokes the double suicide of Rebekka and Rosmer at the end of Rosmersholm?
- 5. Compare and contrast Hedda in *Hedda Gabler* and Hilde in *The Master Builder* as 'demonic dreamers' in their projects regarding, respectively, Løvborg and Solness.
- 6. What was lost and what was gained in the version of *Little Eyolf*, which was staged at the Riverside Studio in February 2006, when compared to the written text which you have studied?
- 7. To what extent may EITHER *The Lady from the Sea* OR *Little Eyolf* be regarded as having 'a happy ending'?
- 8. In what ways may EITHER John Gabriel Borkman OR When We Dead Awaken be considered an expressionist play?
- 9. In relation to ANY TWO OR THREE of the following plays: *Ghosts, The Wild Duck, The Lady from the Sea, Little Eyolf,* consider the question 'why do so many children die in Ibsen's plays?'.
- 10. Compare and contrast the significance of what is said after the death of one or more characters at the end of ANY TWO of the following plays: The Wild Duck, Rosmersholm, Hedda Gabler, The Master Builder, John Gabriel Borkman.
