- 6. 'The experimental information retrieval tradition has been rather sceptical about classification.... The view has been that an algorithm may classify documents based on term frequencies, and that this approach will make "classification" superfluous.' (Hjorland, 'The methodology of constructing classification schemes', 2002). Is this view justified? To what extent can machines replace intellectual effort in the construction of subject tools?
- 7. What are the advantages and disadvantages of downloading records rather than employing an in-house cataloguer?
- 8. To what extent is a special classification necessary for a special subject collection?
