1. What do you envisage will be the principal changes in the functions of the planning system and the role of the planner in UK in the next decade, and how desirable do you see these to be?
2. What evidence is there that European spatial planning policies are having an impact on the UK's current planning system?
3. Provide a critical appraisal of the major concepts, issues and techniques employed by the London Plan, indicating whether or not you believe the public consultation and participation procedures provide sufficient opportunity for principal stakeholders to meaningfully express their concerns.
4. What are the main regeneration lessons that can be learned from the Cross-River Partnership initiative in London, and how do you anticipate it will significantly benefit the South Bank?
5. Multi-sector and integrated approaches to urban regeneration are more likely to produce "win-win" solutions to major problems in deprived areas. *Comment on this claim using health planning as an illustration.*
6. Plans for the Thames Gateway constitute a bold and desperately needed response to the housing, transport and economic development dilemmas of London and the South East. They are, however, critically dependent upon a buoyant private sector and sufficient public sector pre-investment in transport infrastructure. *Comment.*
