- 1. Describe the impact of the restructuring of employment since the 1970s on British cities. To what extent can the public sector influence the geography of employment?
- 2. Critically analyse the factors leading to the 'gentrification' of inner city neighbourhoods. What is the role of planning in this process?
- 3. Critically discuss the argument that the switch to a post-industrial city is characterised by an increasing degree of social polarisation.
- 4. Analyse the trend towards the 'residualisation of council housing' in the UK over the past decades and outline possible policy measures to tackle the problem.
- 5. Critically discuss the factors influencing an individual's residential location decision.
- 6. To which extent does New Labour's urban policy address social exclusion in British cities?
- 7. This quote illustrates criticisms frequently addressed to property-led urban regeneration as practiced by the Urban Development Corporations in the 1980s. "Global over-investment in prestige projects and events provides a highly inefficient subsidy to the private sector and (...) results in the neglect of the basic social infrastructure on which the long-term future of cities depends. Any benefits which are created are distributed unevenly, increasing social inequalities and inhibiting social justice" (Loftman et al, 1994: 3)\(^1\). Discuss.
- 8. Critically analyse the principles underpinning urban policy and planning reforms under the Conservatives (1979-1997).
- 9. Discuss whether policies for the inner city initiated since the 1980s have addressed the situation of ethnic minorities in the UK.
- 10. Who governs in contemporary British cities?
