- 1. Is there a case for medical paternalism?
- 2. In what circumstances can a child: (a) consent to medical treatment; and (b) refuse to be treated? Is the law satisfactory?
- 3. Explain the meaning, scope and implications of the *Bolam* principle. Does it continue to have relevance?
- 4. 'The tort action is a clumsy and inefficient way to compensate those who are injured in medical mishaps.'

Discuss, with particular reference to alternative responses.

- 5. Many believe that section 13(5) of the Human Fertilisation and Embryology Act 1990 is incoherent and value-laden and that it should be removed from the legislation. Are they right or does the provision have any value?
- 6. Whose rights does the English law of abortion recognise? Is there a case for recognising rights which are not currently recognised?
- 7. Discuss critically the law on

EITHER

surrogacy arrangements

OR

human reproductive cloning.

- 8. What legal problems do face transplants pose?
- 9. Discuss critically the legal issues raised in the treatment (including non-treatment) of

EITHER

the severely disabled newborn baby

OR

the adult person in a persistent vegetative state.

Explain how you would improve the law and its administration in the example you choose.

10. Should assisted suicide be decriminalised?
