Question One:

Way 1 – The formation of the League was, in part, to promote Māori health. The description indicates reasonable understanding.

Way 2 – The Rapuora survey was a way used to promote Māori health. The survey provided the information necessary to lobby government for action.

Question Two:

Reason 1 – There are two reasons given in this answer and either would have been sufficient.

Reason 2 – A very, very good answer given for the Rapuora survey.

This candidate, at the end of Question Two, has reached the standard for Merit.

Question Three:

The information given in this answer is mostly correct. But to reach the Excellence standard (which this was very close to getting), the candidate would have needed to be quite clear in describing how the actions of Māori women 'indicated a change or continuation of traditional Māori responses to health issues'. This has not been done - although the marker may infer this. But to gain Excellence marker inference is insufficient and the candidate's answer must be more explicit.

QUESTION ONE

Starting from the 1970s, New Zealand started giving less and less aid, mainly due to their own growing poverty, because as a fairly newly developed country, ~~now~~ they have been giving lots of aid but haven't been receiving any from anyone. This started in 1975 when events crippled New Zealand financially. From the 40% drop in New Zealand's profits, to the admission of Britain into EEC (A ~~economic~~ European Economic Community) which reduced New Zealand's trade with Britain.

Things got worse for New Zealand as the United Nations started raising complaints because New Zealand hasn't been providing enough aid.

In 1985, New Zealand contributed \$1 million, only 0.28% of ~~GDP~~ their Gross National Product, when the target is suppose to be 1%.
